CHANGES TO THE GRANDMONITOR

At the February Grandmont Community Board meeting, the newly formed Grandmonitor committee proposed the following changes:

- Grandmonitor be available monthly in digital format on the Grandmont Community website.
- Grandmonitor be published every other month with an offer to print a copy for residents without access to the internet (*NOTE: This will not be a published copy, rather a copy printed using a home printer.)
- Creating and adopting a “lite” version of the Grandmonitor as an option when there is a need to get time sensitive information out to the community quickly.
- This change be temporary until the pandemic ends and/or funding to pay for the Grandmonitor to be published every month improves based on increased collection of membership dues.

The board voted to grant all of the changes noted above. With that in mind, moving forward, the Grandmonitor will be available electronically online every month on the website (www.grandmontcommunity.org) and a printed copy will be delivered to your home in the months of March, May, July, September and November. Additionally, the “lite” version (no more than two pages) may be delivered to your home based on special circumstances as dictated by the community “by-laws” and/or urgency of the information reaching Grandmont residents.

The Grandmonitor committee is sponsoring a contest to name the new “lite” version of the Grandmonitor. To participate in this contest, submit your entry, along with your contact information, to the editor via email at smiller@grandmontcommunity.org or text at 313-451-2553, no later than April 15th. The prize will be a \$10 gift card to a local business. The winner, along with all of the submitted entries will be printed in the May Grandmonitor. Good luck!

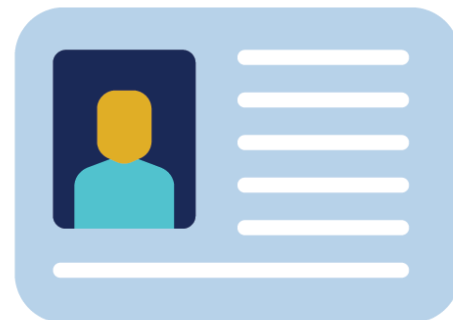

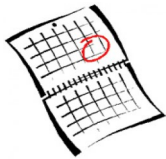

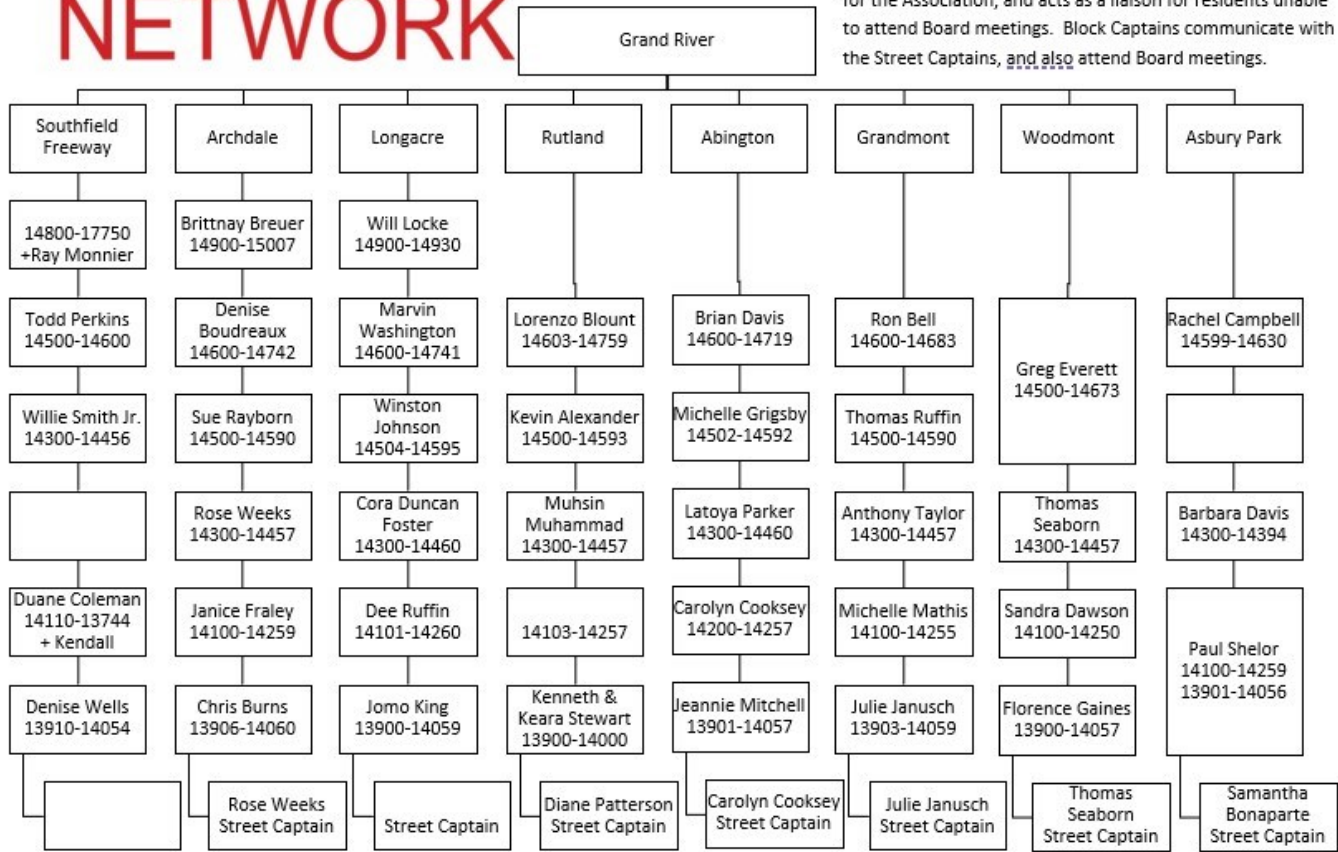

Five groups have registered to service the Detroit Community this summer depending on the Covid-19 Restriction. The groups include: Illinois (2), Michigan (1), Kentucky (1) and Indiana (1). Last year, only three of the 17 residents who submitted an application received the free home repair because of the lack of volunteers during the pandemic.

MARCH FUN FACTS AND TIDBITS!

Ah, March, in like a lion, out like a lamb, or so the saying goes. That's not the only saying attributed to the moody month. For the Northern Hemisphere, March ushers in spring. That was even true back in the days of the Julian calendar when there were only 10 months and March started off the year. Sayings such as "A bushel of March dust is worth a King's ransom," and "March many weathers," remind us of the swiftly changing and windy weather March brings.

The first three days in March were once considered bad luck. They called them the blind days. No one would plant, enter into an agreement or a journey during these days. March is also known for its borrowing days. Though the story has changed through the ages, the month is no stranger to tumultuous weather. Hundreds of years ago the borrowing days were known to be any wild weather day in March. In later years, the days came to be assigned to the last three days in March.

Historically, planting and war go hand in hand in March. Named for the Roman god of War, Mars, March became a time when armies began to march again and farmers tilled their soil. While farming and the military have both dramatically changed since Roman times, March and spring still holds a power over both of them.

March is the month of spring and with it come a lot of activity in nature. Birds migrate. Animals begin to mate. (They give us the phrase, "Mad as a March hare," too.) Plants begin to grow. Even the full moon gets involved. The full moon in March is called the Worm Moon. It earns this name because of all the insects beginning to hatch.

Birth Flowers – Daffodil and Jonquil
Birth Stone – Aquamarine
Zodiac Signs – Pisces and Aries

March Madness kicks into high gear as basketball enthusiasts cheer on their favorite teams. Whether cheering on a local high school team or their college and professional players, fans wear their colors and watch every nail-biting game.

Day light saving time also adds an element of tradition and rancor to the season as many (though not all) spring forward and change their clocks one hour.

WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH

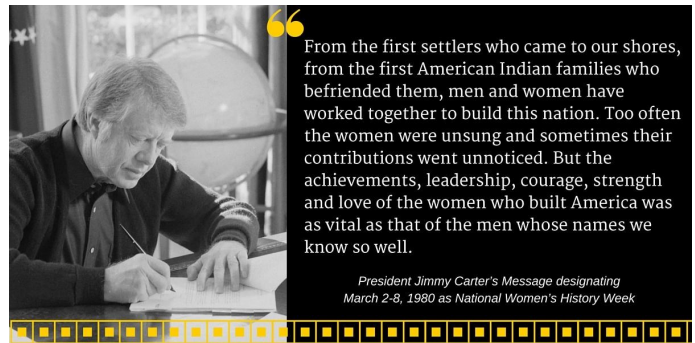
Honoring the accomplishments of women.

Every year March is designated Women's History Month by Presidential proclamation. The month is set aside to honor women's contributions in American history.

Did You Know? Women's History Month started as Women's History Week

Women's History Month began as a local celebration in Santa Rosa, California. The Education Task Force of the Sonoma County (California) Commission on the Status of Women planned and executed a "Women's History Week" celebration in 1978. The organizers selected the week of March 8 to correspond with International Women's Day. The movement spread across the country as other communities initiated their own Women's History Week celebrations the following year.

In 1980, a consortium of women's groups and historians—led by the National Women's History Project (now the National Women's History Alliance)—successfully lobbied for national recognition. In February 1980, President Jimmy Carter issued the first Presidential Proclamation declaring the Week of March 8th 1980 as National Women's History Week.



Subsequent Presidents continued to proclaim a National Women's History Week in March until 1987 when Congress passed Public Law 100-9, designating March as "Women's History Month." Between 1988 and 1994, Congress passed additional resolutions requesting and authorizing the President to proclaim March of each year as Women's History Month. Since 1995, each president has issued an annual proclamations designating the month of March as "Women's History Month."

The National Women's History Alliance selects and publishes the yearly theme. The theme for Women's History Month in 2021 captures the spirit of these challenging times. Since many of the women's suffrage centennial celebrations originally scheduled for 2020 were curtailed, the National Women's History Alliance is extending the annual theme for 2021 to "Valiant Women of the Vote: Refusing to Be Silenced. REMINDERS AND FUN!

TRASH TALKING!

First, please **bag your trash!** Don't throw loose trash or garbage into your container. Squirrels and raccoons already seem to be on the fast-track to damage these containers; providing 'enticing aromas' to them only speed up the process. Not only is that trash and garbage likely to end up in the street, but eventually your container will stink! (Remember, if your Courville Lid or Wheels are damaged, they may be repaired or replaced for free. Call 844-233-8764 for more information.)

RECYCLING REDUCES GARBAGE! GET A FREE BLUE CONTAINER!

Is your garbage container overflowing every Friday for garbage day? Recycling can reduce that TRASH. You can pay \$25.00 for a Blue Recycling container by calling Advance Disposal/Waste Management at 844-233-8764, or get one **FREE from the City**, by going to the City of Detroit Website "Detroit Recycles." Play the interactive "Recycling Challenge" game, watch the video, and you will be get a new blue recycling container free of charge. You can also call Zero Waste Detroit at 313-986-2990, or Green Living Science at 313-871-4000, Ext.3 for more information .

Getting your packages delivered to your door? Those cardboard boxes can be flattened and recycled. Tape should be removed first.

ACCEPTABLE CURBSIDE RECYCLING ITEMS:

- Paper (newspapers, envelopes, etc.)
- Plastic (NO PLASTIC BAGS) water bottles, milk jugs, etc.
- Cardboard (cereal boxes, toilet and paper towel rolls, etc.)
- Metal (soup cans, clean tin foil, etc.)
- Glass (wine bottles, pasta sauce jars, etc.)

UNACCEPTABLE RECYCLING ITEMS:

- Paper milk and juice cartons
- Plastic bags
- Styrofoam containers and Styrofoam packaging
- Juice boxes
- Garbage
- Propane tanks
- Paint cans
- Medical waste
- Flammable liquids
- Household cleaners
- Chemicals (dry or liquid)
- Wood items
- Yard waste, wood or trash
- Batteries or light bulbs

Remember – if in doubt about what is recyclable, don't put it in the recycling container.



GOOD INFORMATION FOR YOU!

Take a look at the City of Detroit's Website. Good Information is at your fingertips with just a few clicks. For instance, did you know you can get a "snapshot" of who, what, when, etc.

Type: **City of Detroit Departments.**

Under the '*Spirit of Detroit*' Logo, and above where in bold capital letters it says **DEPARTMENTS**, there is a "**Where am I:**" line and a faint underlined Home button. Click the Home button. Scroll down under the boxes to where you see, **Get info on your home and neighborhood.** You will see **MY HOME INFO:**

Enter your home address where prompted: example: 12345 Main, then hit enter. You will see your garbage collection dates, property parcel ID#, NPO-Police info, any outstanding blight tickets, and more.


