We are grateful for those volunteer warriors which were out there on the front line making it happen for the entire community.

Property values are starting to slowly climb upward. Are you aware that our Vacant House Task Force worked on projects every month in 2012? They were constantly asking

for neighbors to come out to help. Just a couple hours a month made a tremendous difference in boarding up and painting the boards on vacant and abandoned houses on every block. Several residents worked diligently to eliminate unsightly blight in our community. Cutting grass and removing debris helped Grandmont maintain a "polished look" to perspective home buyers; but the call that went out for assistance in getting the job done had few replies. Crime rates are generally lower within our boundaries than in the surrounding areas. Finding new volunteers to support our mobile radio patrol is scarce. The Farmers Market, located within our community boundary, continues to provide the fresh fruits and vegetables that many communities in the city have no access to and desperately needs our support.

As we reflect on 2012, the key question we all must answer is "Did I do anything to help my community move forward"? What would happen (heaven forbid!) if everyone who is currently active in the community just stopped? What if simultaneously they grew weary of the lack of community engagement and neighborhood apathy? The thought of that scenario is frightening!

Let's All Get on the Ball in 2013. What is in your personal "Comprehensive Plan" for the New Year? Every small contribution will make an impact on the whole. Remember, if you are not an ACTIVE part of the solution, then you are part of the problem. I pray for each family ~ Blessings of Health, Prosperity and Joy.



It's a good aspiration for the New Year in Grandmont as budgets get cut and city services decline. An Irish saying that's also appropriate is: "Be happy with what you have, and you will have plenty to be happy about." We have plenty to be grateful for in our neighborhood, and that should make us all happy. Grandmont can be proud of its accomplishments and reputation in these trying times thanks to the many caring, energetic, enthusiastic volunteers who give tirelessly of their time to make our neighborhood — and city a better place to live. Our neighborhood relies on the good will and extra efforts of each of us to make a good "first impression" of the good neighbors and the architecturally diverse homes in the Grandmont Community.

JANUARY ~

Reflections and resolutions usually begin the New Year. For many, it's a time to make a fresh start, to re-think life choices and resolve to do better in 2013. We have many neighbors new to the Grandmont Community. Some know of Grandmont's history and embrace the quality of life we have come to expect. Others, we hope, feel fortunate to "discover" Grandmont after purchasing their homes. We welcome new families to our community and want you to experience the positive aspects of living here and also of being included within the Grandmont Rosedale Development Corporation (GRDC) boundaries.

That being said, it should be no surprise that we expect the best of our neighbors and families. Our properties should be litter free, landscaped, and maintained. "I just didn't get around to it" are not words that should be said regularly. We'd rather hear more of, "Where there's a will, there's a way" when it comes to home maintenance and pride of property. Take a look around and make some positive changes. Little things, if left undone, just become bigger issues and more difficult to handle or correct. "Just Do IT" is often easier in the long run!

Here are a few suggestions to help get the year off to a good start and create better expectations and first impressions:

- Curtains, drapery, and blinds should be in good condition and hung in the windows properly. Torn or damaged shades, etc., need to be removed and replaced with proper window treatments. And it should go without saying that windows of occupied houses should not be boarded.
- Dogs should be leashed when being walked and don't forget to use the 'POOPER SCOOPER'. Habitually loud, barking dogs need attention and/or training. You need watchful neighbors to see WHY your dog is barking (or ALARM is ringing). Unfortunately, angry or sleep deprived neighbors might not be too helpful in observing suspect activity.
- Do not park your vehicles on the lawn or berm area. Take your time when you pull into your driveway especially if you have a narrow drive and a large car (it should get easier with patience, time, and practice!). Cars need to be parked on cement or black-top even on private property. DPW can and will issue tickets for unlicensed/un-plated cars parked on lawns. (Commercial trucks need to be parked outside of our neighborhood.) Our goal is not to have tickets issued, but rather for everyone to enjoy a pleasant and serene view when we look out our windows.

HOMES FOR SALE IN GRANDMONT ROSEDALE – If you, or anyone you know, are looking to buy a home in the Grandmont Rosedale area, then be sure to visit our web site, **www.GrandmontRosedale.com**, to see the renovated homes that are available from GRDC. GRDC homes are all move-in ready, with many updated features. Down payment assistance is also available to help buyers reduce their out-of-pocket costs and to make home buying more affordable.

In 2013, GRDC will be receiving a grant from the City of Detroit Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP). This grant will enable us to buy and renovate nine more vacant area homes. Eight of the nine homes are being purchased through a cooperative arrangement with the Detroit Land Bank Authority. These long-vacant homes were foreclosed for non-payment of taxes, and will be renovated and ready to purchase this spring and summer. OPPORTUNITY FOR LOW-INCOME CONSTRUCTION WORKERS AND BUSINESSES — If you are a low-income resident of the Grandmont Rosedale area and have skills and experience in home renovation and construction, GRDC would like to help connect you with contractors working on federally-funded home repair and renovation projects in our area.

GRDC utilizes federal funds provided by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to renovate vacant houses and to provide home repair grants and loans to low-income homeowners in the Grandmont Rosedale area. Under Section 3 of the HUD Act of 1968, wherever HUD financial assistance is given for housing or community development, to the greatest extent feasible, economic opportunities must be given to low- and very low-income residents and businesses located in that area.

To qualify under Section 3, construction businesses must be owned by low - or very low-income residents, employ low - or very low-income residents in full-time positions, or subcontract with businesses that provide economic opportunities to low - and very low -income persons. GRDC will work together with local residents and contractors participating in our federally funded programs to share information about employment and/or training opportunities for residents who qualify under Section 3.

Detroit City Councilman James Tate and Karla Henderson, Group Executive for Planning & Facilities from Mayor Bing's office, will also be participating in the discussion about creating a SAD ordinance that will benefit many neighborhoods in Detroit. SAD Task Force members will also be available to answer questions.

Neighborhood Safety meetings are open to the public. Please join your neighbors, local law enforcement officials and guest speakers as we learn and share crime prevention strategies. Every meeting provides important information to help keep us and our neighborhoods safer! HOME REPAIR PROGRAM – The City of Detroit, through its Planning & Development Department, provides home repair services under the CDBG Home Repair Program. Utilizing grant funds provided by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), this program assists homeowners with their home repair needs, including eliminating lead-based paint hazards and addressing structural defects affecting the health and safety of its residents. Additionally, the CDBG Home Repair Program supports the city's efforts to preserve existing housing inventory and stabilize neighborhoods.

City of Detroit residents interested in receiving home repair services are invited to complete the "Home Repair Program Entry Form" which will place your name and information on a waiting list. Names are drawn from this list to receive a CDBG Home Repair Application as targeted areas are identified and home repair funds are available.

The "Home Repair Program Entry Form" is available online from the City of Detroit web site. Go to the Planning & Development page and click on the Home Repair Program Information link. Fill out the entry form and email to hRP@detroitmi.gov. To download and complete the form, you will need the latest copy of Adobe Acrobat Reader. For questions, please contact the City of Detroit's Housing Services Division at (313) 224-3461.

Eligible clients must meet the following minimum program requirements:

- Detroit must be your primary residence
- Your home must be an owner-occupied single family or a duplex housing unit
- You must not be delinquent on your property taxes
- You must have current homeowner's insurance
- The applicant must have owned the home for at least six months and the deed must be in the name of the applicant

Other requirements may apply. You must meet the income guidelines at 80% area median income (AMI) or below:

1 person \$36,600 3 people \$47,050 5 people \$56,450 7 people \$64,800 2 people \$41,800 4 people \$52,250 6 people \$60,650 8 people \$69,000

Our goal is to provide timely information to residents and when possible and appropriate, to offer crime prevention strategies and reminders that may help keep us safer in the future. It takes a **LOT** of people to keep track of and take care of all of the vacant houses in our neighborhood. Please do all that you can to maintain the yards of the vacant houses on your block – pick up trash and flyers, and do what you can to make the house look occupied. 

Household Hazardous Waste April 20; Paper shredder June 15 & Nov 16.

We can recycle the following items. **SORT** and **SEPARATE** the items as follows before bringing them to the Recycling Center.

NEWSPAPERS: Place into paper bags or tie in bundles. Inserts can be left inside. If it comes in a newspaper, it can be recycled with the newspaper.

MIXED PAPER: White and colored office paper, envelopes, junk mail, folders, construction paper, and cardstock. CANNOT BE RECYCLED: Tissue paper, receipts, napkins, wrapping paper, and paper towels.

GLOSSY PAPER: Magazines, catalogs, flyers. Keep separate from newspapers or mixed paper.

BOOKS: Bound, hardcover, paperbacks, and telephone books. No magazines in with books.

CARDBOARD: Brown, gray, white interiors; corrugated cardboard boxes; cereal boxes, shoe boxes, Kleenex boxes; paper grocery bags; EMPTY, CLEAN, and FLATTEN.

ASEPTIC CARTONS: Milk, soymilk, juice cartons. Remove plastic top, RINSE, flatten.

GLASS BOTTLES & JARS: Separate by color—clear, brown, green. RINSE & REMOVE TOPS; recycle metal lids with metals. NOT ACCEPTED: Plexiglas, Pyrex, window glass, drinking glasses.

Metals: No need to separate: tin or metal cans; copper, brass, aluminum foil, pie pans or cans; RINSE and REMOVE LABELS; flatten if possible to save space.

PLASTICS: Remove caps and tops and discard unless labeled as recyclable. Labels can be left on containers. Sort according to number on bottom of containers:



Packing "peanuts" must be in separate plastic bag from other Stvrofoam.

PLASTIC BAGS: 1, 2 & 4 plastic grocery, dry cleaning, & newspaper bags.

NOT ACCEPTED: Bubble wrap, garbage bags, Ziploc food bags. Bags must be clean and dry, receipts removed.

BATTERIES & LIGHT BULBS: Household batteries: AAA through D, 9 volt, and cell phone batteries: Light Bulbs: incandescent & compact fluorescent (CFLs)—no tube fluorescents
