

**APRIL** ~ We all benefit from a beautiful, clean, and healthy environment. Along with the anticipation of green lawns, fresh landscaping and planted flowers, don't neglect the street in front of your home. Leaves and debris accumulate so quickly! Remember to rake (or shovel!) along that area − it will help keep our street-drains less clogged which can help prevent those spring and summer flooded streets and basements.



Spring is the perfect time to plan and consider how to make your home and garden more attractive in the summer months. Detroiters have a great sense of pride; pride in ourselves, our homes and our city. Whether homeowners or renters, that

pride is evident in our property and how we maintain it.



A sense of collective and individual responsibility on all our parts is essential to maintaining pride of community appearance that keeps Grandmont a beautiful neighborhood. TAKE ADVANTAGE OF OUR GCA FLOWER SALE to beautify your property. REMEMBER TO "LOVE WHERE YOU LIVE" and LIVE "LITTER-FREE".

Some other things that make spring a smoother transition into summer is to be a considerate neighbor. Celebrations, BBQ's, open-windows, children playing, dogs being walked, etc. are part of this transition so while keeping your spirits up, please keep the noise down:

- PETS NEED TO BE ON A LEASH: walk your pet and carry a pooper-scooper. Use it when necessary. Pets are not permitted in Ramsay Park for a reason children play and everyone walks there. We shouldn't have to 'watch every step.
- **PARTIES AND CELEBRATIONS:** Keep the noise level to a minimum. Excessively loud, amplified parties are an illegal nuisance. Afternoon and early evening parties are appreciated with minimal noise. **THANK YOU!**
- CAR RADIO AND OTHER SOUND SYSTEMS: Be a good neighbor and keep the volume down.
- **VERY-EARLY MORNING LAWN CUTTING:** before 9 AM is discouraged.
- PORTABLE BASKETBALL HOOPS: These are meant for the backyard and <u>not legal</u> on the streets. Parents, please be aware of the danger of speeding cars and other dangers and remind your children to play in the backyard and not in the street. (Detroit City Ordinance Article 1 Section 50-1-12 states..."No person shall play any game in any street, alley, or public place..." <u>Call Community Relations to report illegal street basketball at 313-596-5617, 313-596-5681 or 5682</u>.
- CALL DPW ENVIRONMENTAL AFFAIRS TO REPORT BLIGHT: 313-876-0974. Ask for a complaint number for follow-up.




