hen you think of basketball what do you think? Do you think of rich, famous, and fun? Well, there is more to basketball; for example, practice, hurt, sweat, anger, joy, and much more. If you are asking what starts these emotions, I'll tell you. I won't leave you hanging at least not now; it's losing practice, games, and stress.

Imagine yourself being in 6th grade on Junior Varsity but, moved up to 7th, mostly 8th grade Varsity. Imagine the challenges and the obstacles. JUNE ~ Celebrate Summer! Children playing, neighborly conversations and leisurely strolls, vegetable and flower planting, yard work and landscaping, are all part of a **COMMUNITY** in the summertime. Fresh air and open windows can make the month of June even more enjoyable. Just keep in mind some summer civility practices to keep this season even more pleasurable:



- Be respectful and considerate of your neighbors with regard to noise. Continuously
 barking dogs, loud radios, parties, yelling, etc. is disruptive to others. Loud noise can be a nuisance and
 noise levels should be kept to a minimum whenever possible. Be respectful of your neighbors and avoid
 early morning lawn cuttings if possible.
- Maintain your yard. Your lawn (front and back) needs to be cut. Grandmont takes pride in the
 architecture and diversity of our homes and gardens, but the one common factor we all appreciate is
 regularly cut lawns that frame our homes. Appearances matter; curb appeal counts!
- Vehicle Parking. If at all possible, please keep your cars parked off the street. Safety and Security are
 much more effective without cars parked on the street. It should go without saying that cars should be
 parked off grassy areas. It is hazardous to have oil leaks and other fluids leaching into the ground. The
 resulting tire ruts are not only unsightly to your neighbors view, but contribute to lawn and landscape
 damage. Abandoned and inoperable, unlicensed/non-plated cars are illegal and create blight.

We hope you agree that these common, courteous, practices contribute to Grandmont good-neighbor living and enhance our environment for everyone's enjoyment. These reminders help everyone experience the joys of a safe and secure summer. It's always a good thing to pay attention to your environment - and be aware of your surroundings.

TREE PLANTING IN GRANDMONT: Thank you Greening of Detroit!



Greening of Detroit did a wonderful job of planting trees in Grandmont on April 27, 2013. Thank you! And thank you to all the volunteers who worked vigorously to re-tree our neighborhood. Their very well organized campaign to plant trees is a testimony to hope for the future and a resurgence of green city living. Cleaner air, less pollution a healthier atmosphere, and improved quality of life prevails when shade offers a solution to extremely hot, sunny days; cooler heads prevail and tempers seem more subdued when shaded areas are available. It is a fact that neighborhoods are more architecturally pleasing - and valued - when trees add to our landscape.

YARD WASTE - DO YOU KNOW OUR NEW COLLECTION DATES?

Detroit Department of Public Works to Begin Twice Monthly Collection of Yard Waste: In April 2013, the City of Detroit Department of Public Works (DPW) implemented a new schedule to collect yard waste twice a month. Residents on the west side will have yard waste collection on the 2nd and 4th weeks of the month. The collection will occur from mid-April through the first week in December.

IN GRANDMONT, since each Friday is our regular garbage collection day, dates for Yard Waste will be collected on these **2nd and 4th Fridays in 2013**:

June 14th, June 28th; July 12th, July 26th; Aug. 9th, Aug. 23rd; Sept.13th, Sept 27th; Oct.10th, Oct 24th; Nov. 8th, Nov. 22nd

Residents can place grass clippings, leaves, and small twigs in biodegradable paper bags or personal containers on the same day their weekly refuse is collected. **DPW WILL NOT COLLECT YARD WASTE IN PLASTIC BAGS**.

Branches, up to 4 feet only in length and less than 2 inches in diameter, should be bundled and tied. Any branches or wood sticking up out of the Courville trash container will NOT be picked up as that can damage their equipment. You may take the yard waste to the Southfield Yard located at 12255 Southfield Service Drive (southbound) between Schoolcraft and Plymouth Road.

ARE STREET LIGHTS OUT ON YOUR BLOCK?

If so, the number to call for a non-working street light in front of your home: (313) 267-7266. Call Monday –Friday between 9 AM and 2 PM. Since there is only one person taking this information, please be patient.

Have ready: The ADDRESS of where the light is out as well as the two cross-streets between that address. If you leave a message, YOU WILL BE CONTACTED ONLY IF YOU LEAVE YOUR NAME, ADDRESS, AND PHONE NUMBER. You will receive a Tracking Number (keep that handy). Allow 14 days; if the light is still not repaired call (313) 267-7288 and give them the tracking number. That person should be able to give you more detailed information on the repair status.



"YOU DIRTY RAT!" ... If you are old enough or a movie buff you will recognize that statement as attributed to actor James Cagney in a 1931 film. Unfortunately, "you dirty rat" today might mean a sighting of one or more of these "literal dirty rats" - rodents scurrying through our neighborhood! Yes, rats are alive and well in Grandmont - and that's not a good thing. Fortunately, we can do something about it but just as it takes a village ... this resolve takes an active community effort.

Back in the 1970's former Mayor Coleman A. Young instituted a comprehensive Rodent Control Program handled through the City Health Department. Back then we had more alleys and used galvanized trash/garbage containers and plastic bags for refuse. It was thought that alley closures and the move toward the more secure and sturdy Courville containers would curb or eliminate much of the rodent problem in the City. While that made sense, it is regrettable that many people don't maintain – or replace – their garbage containers when they start to deteriorate. Holes in sides and lids and the fact that people will overfill their container so that the lid remains open days before our scheduled garbage pick-up allow rodents easy access. Also, while **your** home may not be a haven for rats, the proliferation of vacant homes and lots, lax home and garage/shed and building maintenance and unchecked pet areas all contribute to rat proliferation.

YOU MIGHT ASK, WHAT IS THE PROBLEM? Rats bite people. Rats cause disease and death. People are indifferent and careless in handling food and refuse. Killing rats without continuing good sanitation does not solve the problem.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW: Educate yourself to recognize the signs of infestation: droppings, runways, burrows, gnawing and tracks. Neighbors working together will bring greater success. Proper storage of garbage is a personal responsibility of everyone in keeping our property free of junk and rubbish. Keeping a neighborhood clean and rat free increases property values. It only takes an ounce of food and water every day to sustain rats. Their favorite foods are garbage, dog/cat/bird food, and animal feces. Home gardens are also a major source of fresh food for rats so be watchful for signs of rodents and clean up after your pets.

WHAT YOU NEED TO DO: IF YOU SEE RATS AROUND YOUR PROPERTY:

CALL DPW ENVIRONMENTAL AFFAIRS AT 313-876-0974. You will need to leave your contact name and phone number. An inspector will be out to investigate within 3-5 days and will bait the **exterior only** of your property. If rats or mice are inside your home, you must remedy the situation yourself and/or call a professional exterminator.

IF YOU NEED CONTAINER SERVICES:

The DPW Container Services Program stocks all new and old refuse containers and parts. This unit is responsible for the placements of refuse containers to residential households, large apartment complexes and commercial establishments. There is a **\$40** placement fee required for assignment of mobile plastic containers at residential households. Once you have paid that fee, your container will be repaired/replaced free of charge.

Additional information regarding container storage placement: Pursuant to City of Detroit Ordinance #22-2-43: Residents must store their container on their property in either the side or rear yard. The container cannot be stored at the curb, in the front yard or on the front porch. Storage in this manner allows the premises to be maintained in an orderly, aesthetically pleasing manner that will help the resident and the City in its efforts to keep Detroit clean. The container has a hinged lid that opens and shuts easily and is designed to keep odors in, but rain and rodents out.

Tip: Bag all refuse placed in your container. Wash out your container frequently with a water hose to maintain its cleanliness.

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
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
