

#### JUNE, 2014:

CELEBRATE SUMMER! Children playing, neighborly conversations and leisurely strolls, vegetable and flower planting, yard work and landscaping, are all part of a community in the summertime. Fresh air and open windows can make the month of June even more enjoyable. Keep in mind some summer "good manner" habits to make this season even more pleasurable. We hope you agree that these common courteous practices, contribute to Grandmont good-neighbor living and improve our environment for everyone's enjoyment.

- Be respectful and considerate of your neighbors with regard to noise. Continuously barking dogs, yelling, etc. is disruptive and disrespectful to everyone. Loud noise travels and can be a nuisance. Please be thoughtful of others since many of us have erratic job schedules, sleep issues, etc.
- Maintain your yard. Your lawn (front and back) needs to be cut. Grandmont takes pride in the architecture and diversity of our homes and gardens, but the one common factor we all appreciate is regularly cut lawns that frame our homes. Appearances matter, curb appeal counts.
- Vehicles: It should go without saying that cars should be parked off the grass. It is offensive and unsafe to have oil leaks and other fluids leaching into the ground. The resulting tire ruts are not only unsightly, but contribute to lawn and landscape damage.

**SAFETY & SURROUNDINGS**: As always, we need to be present in the neighborhood. That means be watchful and aware of your surroundings. Parking: We encourage you to park in your garage or driveway, and not in the street for safety and security concerns. Warmer weather means more children playing and it only takes a minute for a child to run into the street. Parked cars make it more difficult to see that happening. Streets free of vehicles also allow easier passage for police and emergency vehicles. Suspicious cars are more easily identified. Be prepared for the unexpected. **STAY SAFE...AND SLOW DOWN!** 

Some other things that make Spring a smoother transition into summer is to be a considerate neighbor. Celebrations, BBQ's (in back-yards please!), open-windows, children playing, dogs being walked, etc. are part of this summer transition. While keeping your spirits up, please keep the noise down.

- PARTIES AND CELEBRATIONS. Keep the noise level to a minimum. Excessively loud, amplified parties are an illegal nuisance.
- CAR RADIO AND OTHER SOUND SYSTEMS. Be a good neighbor and keep the volume down.
- Very-early morning Lawn Cutting is discouraged.
- PORTABLE BASKETBALL HOOPS. These are meant for the backyard and not legal on the streets. Parents, please be aware of the danger of speeding cars and other dangers and remind your children to play in the backyard and not in the street. (Detroit City Ordinance Article 1 Section 50-1-12 states... "No person shall play any game in any street, alley, or public place..."
- CURFEW REMINDER:

**DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME**: 10:00 PM - 15 Years & Under; 11:00 PM - 16 & 17 Years

STANDARD TIME: 8:00 PM - 15 Years & Under; 9:00 PM - 16 & 17 Years, Sunday - Thursday

11:00 PM - 16 & 17 Years, Friday & Saturday

#### VACANT PROPERTY UPDATES:

We are working with law enforcement to discourage and eliminate some unscrupulous practices in our communities. This involves mortgage fraud and/or people trying to profit from renting or selling properties they don't own. In some cases, both the "sellers" and "prospective buyers-renters" may be working together and are aware that their schemes are not legal, but decide that it's a good deal for them. It's NOT a good deal for our community. Paid taxes pay for City services. Often taxes don't get paid, and properties become neglected and deteriorate more quickly because home-maintenance is ignored or rental property is not inspected or registered. After awhile, (or if the property will soon be foreclosed) these people move to another house and start the process all over again. Be a watchful neighbor - know the house address, note the date, and take pictures. Get descriptions and/or license plate numbers, vehicle color, make, & model information, and report any suspicious activities to the police or to the Vacant House Task Force members. Our community deserves the "good neighbors" we expect and count on to contribute to a better Detroit and safer Grandmont community.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL CORNER - VACANT PROPERTY TASK FORCE, cont'd:**

#### HELPFUL HOME-PURCHASING/RENTAL GUIDELINES

AN IMPORTANT REMINDER: a QCD (Quit Claim Deed) offers no guarantees that all taxes have been paid or that you are the owner of record. You need to verify with the Wayne County Register of Deeds that you have purchased, leased or rented your property from the legal owner. TRUST, BUT VERIFY IS A GOOD LIFE LESSON LEARNED. Call the Register of Deeds for further information at 313-224-5854. There have been instances we know of where substantial taxes are owed on the property, leaving the renter or land-contract purchaser unknowingly in jeopardy of being evicted without prior notice. Often the CURRENT taxes are paid, but there is outstanding tax or penalties owed for prior years and the home can be subject to foreclosure. Check with the Wayne County Treasurer's Office (313) 224-5990 and also verify that the person you are buying the house from (and paying your money to) actually holds title to the property.

#### **NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH IS VERY IMPORTANT!**

The weather is finally getting warmer and the harsh winter blues are gone. However, there has been a recent increase in B & E's, theft from and of vehicles and robberies of individuals, most armed.

Everyone needs to stay alert and aware of who and what is around us at all times! Here are some important things to do to increase our safety:

- 1. Make it a common practice: When you are coming home, circle your area for a block or two and see if there is anything suspicious going on.
  - When you are leaving in the morning, circle your block or two before you leave the neighborhood.
- 2. "Patrol" your neighborhood. Look as you drive through your neighborhood. Notice anything that "doesn't look right".
- 3. As always, watch someone who is unfamiliar to you on your block and call neighbors on your block and the next block to suggest they do the same. If you do not have a list of phone numbers and email addresses, start making one right now. Anyone would want to be on a list where they knew someone is watching out for them and their homes and would call if anything suspicious was going on. **ANYONE!** Even if your block does not have a list make your own! Three, five, ten people any number is better than nothing.
- 4. Keep a notebook in your car so you can write down: color, make and model of suspicious vehicles and most important license plate numbers when you see something of concern. If it is a person, note clothes, height, weight, hair anything that might help the police pick out that person if they came out on one of our calls and saw them walking down the street.
- 5. Call 911 if you see a crime going on or an emergency and be sure to have location number such as a house address; if it is no longer an emergency, call the Crime Reporting Number–313-267-4600 and ask for the report number to help you track any results in the future.
- 6. If you have an iPhone or other "smartphone", program this e-mail address into your phone: "beinfo@yahoo.com". These are police officers assigned to our area to give special attention to us in NW Detroit. Report this above info to them also. They have asked us repeatedly to: "Don't worry about whether what you are sending is important or not. Let us (the police officers) decide that when we get your information. Just keep us informed of anything suspicious".
- 7. Be a part of the official "**EYES AND EARS**" in your community by calling your Radio Patrol President and coming to their next meeting to find out if you are able to be a part of this volunteer group in your neighborhood. There is strength in numbers. We are getting stronger and stronger, but are not there yet. Find out how you can help.

#### SPECIAL ASSESSMENT DISTRICT ORDINANCE PASSES

On April 29<sup>th</sup>, Detroit City Council voted unanimously to pass the Special Assessment District (**SAD**) ordinance. This ordinance establishes a process through which neighborhoods such as Grandmont Rosedale could create local Special Assessment Districts to collect special fees specifically for such services as snow removal and security. On Monday, June 2<sup>nd</sup>, new city services for trash pick-up will begin in our neighborhood. Our new provider is Advanced Disposal and they are located at 12255 Southfield Road, Detroit, MI 48228 right near our neighborhood where many of us have dropped off bulk or yard waste in the past.

The changes are significant and will be a much needed improvement in many ways. Bulk pick-up is scheduled for every other week with yard waste and we now have the opportunity to recycle every other Friday along with our garbage. 
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
