

UPDATE ON RAMSAY PARK'S "ADOPTED" STATUS

A few years ago, when the City became short of money to provide all but the most necessary services, Ramsay Park was put on the list of parks the City would no longer maintain. However, the Grandmont Community Association stepped up. Not only did we keep the grass cut and the park clean for our children and other residents and visitors, but the Association applied for and received grants that enabled the purchase of lights, picnic tables, trees and plants to make our park the beautiful place it is now to host baseball for the children and our many special events. It was then very much a surprise to find out that it had been adopted by Starr Vista. A meeting was quickly organized to make sure we maintained control of our beloved park.

On Wednesday, July 9, 2014, Stephanie Young, Manager District 1 Mayor's Office Department of Neighborhoods; Chuck Jackson, Executive Director of Starr Vista; Lorenzo Blount and I met to discuss our concerns at Always Brewing Detroit, 19180 Grand River. Mr. Jackson mentioned that he wanted to do something positive for the city so he got a list of parks and adopted Ramsay Park. He and his team just wanted to do something good for the community. His team works in Human Services. Thus, they like to help people. His staff is all volunteer. They have picked up trash at Ramsay Park and will continue to do so. Mr. Jackson has agreed to pay half of the grass cutting costs at Ramsay Park. This agreement will be for



the rest of the year. He would like the park cut every week. We discussed how the city placed an already adopted Ramsay by Grandmont Community Association on the list of parks to be adopted. Communication was lacking between Grandmont Community Association and Starr Vista. Lorenzo reminded Ms. Young about our GCA Adopted Park Sign for Ramsay. Immediately, she emailed Mrs. Trina Tucker, Adopt-A-Park Coordinator to remind her about our sign.

He said his team would be glad to attend and also volunteered to help. We are looking forward to a productive partnership.

Everyone can make a few improvements to better our environment. And, if you need help, ask for help!

EVERYBODY IS A CONTRIBUTOR: Your actions matter. They are powerful influences on you, your family, and your future. Your contribution can be a positive influence or have a negative impact based on choices you make. Our neighborhood is stronger because people take the time to create positive energy to take care of the little things. Those little things make a big difference to our surroundings and safety. ENVIRONMENTAL CORNER – VACANT PROPERTY TASK FORCE, cont'd:

<u>LIGHT THE NIGHT!</u> Please keep your porch, side and back lights on at night – and your eyes and ears open. Safety and Security and the Environment frequently go hand in hand. One of the best crime prevention tools are the eyes and ears of alert, concerned neighbors. Even the most vigilant neighbor won't be able to see your unlit home. While alarm systems can offer protection and peace of mind, the location of the siren noise is often difficult to pinpoint. A watchful neighbor can help identify criminal activity if your home is well-lit at night.

REMINDER: THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW: Grandmont is a neighborhood of single-family residential homes:

Commercial vehicles cannot park on our streets overnight, and are not allowed on your private property Ongoing car repair is not allowed

Unlicensed or non-plated vehicles need to be kept in a closed garage.



CITY'S NEW RECYCLE PROGRAM TO START IN SEPTEMBER


OPTIONAL RECYCLING COLLECTION ~ The City will now offer curbside recycling for all residents who request the service.

HOUSEHOLDS THAT DON'T HAVE CURBSIDE RECYCLING ~ Curbside recycling will be available in September. To take part, residents will need to go online to www.AdvancedDisposal.com/DetroitResidential or call (844) 2-DETROIT (233-8764) to request a 64-gallon recycling container. There is a ONE-TIME FEE OF \$25.00 FOR THE CONTAINER. Residents will receive additional recycling information in the mail.

- Recyclables must be placed curbside prior to 7 AM on the scheduled collection day.
- Place all recyclables in the provided container for single stream collection no sorting is necessary.
- Place container within 4 feet of the curb with handle facing toward the residential unit and away from the street.
- Place container at least 3 feet away from all other objects such as mailbox, car, garbage container, etc.
- · Items accepted for recycling pickup include:
 - Glass bottles and jars
 - Aluminum cans and foil
 - Steel and bi-metal cans and containers
 - Scrap metal not exceeding 3' in any dimension
 - Plastic materials made from PET and HDPE (Plastics #1 through #7)
 - Corrugated paper
 - Newspaper
