Grandmont Radio Patrol Vacant House Task Force

Our first Grandmont New Year Dues Collection Blitz for 2015 will be held on Saturday, January 10th at 10 AM if the weather permits.

The Grandmont Board of Directors with the Street/Block Captains will blitz every month starting in January. We plan to go door to door to meet the residents and collect the \$25.™ annual dues (\$10.™ on Southfield and Longacre Apts.)

We plan to continue the monthly membership dues blitz in order to keep providing valuable community services like snow removal, special events and this newsletter.

DECEMBER, 2014 PRESIDENT'S REPORT ~ CORA DUNCAN-FOSTER

1. GCA Scholarship Committee of Charlotte Hoefer, Joanne Podlucky and I met to review Dominique Taylor's scholarship packet. We had only one scholarship applicant to apply. Ms. Taylor had maintained a 3.51 grade point average at Renaissance High School and is now attending Siena Heights University. She will be interviewed by a panel from the Grandmont Board of Directors, Scholarship Committee Members and other Committee Chairs at a later date. Her father, Anthony Taylor, is now the Block Captain for 14101-14260 block of Longacre.



- 2. We need a Street Captain for the Southfield Service Drive and Abington Streets. Also, there is a Block Captain vacancy for 14500-600 Southfield Service Drive.
- 3. The GCA Board of Directors approved a motion to accept GREENER STILL'S Snow Removal Contract. Again, this year GREENER STILL, INC. will be plowing our streets. Choice was made because GREENER STILL is bonded with liability insurance and is a licensed snow removal company.
- The Northwest District 6th/8th Police Community Relations meeting was held November 24th at 4. Bushnell Congregational Church. The guest speaker was Rodney Liggons, Detroit Land Bank Authority (DLBA). The DLBA is a public entity created to tackle the huge surplus of vacant, abandoned and foreclosed property in the city and return them to productive use. You can find additional information on their website at www.buildingdetroit.org. In order for property to be demolished by the DLBA, it must be: vacant, residential property of four units or less, owned by the DLBA and located within one of the hardest hit fund target areas. Contact the district manager or website at www.detroitmi.gov under the Department of Neighborhoods link if a property doesn't meet the criteria. When a house is to be demolished, posters will go out and information is distributed to the neighboring houses. This process takes approximately 6-8 weeks. During demolition, people and pets should stay indoors as much as possible with windows and doors closed. The Nuisance Abatement Program sues private owners of vacant properties that are boarded, open to trespass, abandoned or neglected that pose immediate threat to the quality of life of nearby residents. The goal is for owners to sign an agreement to rehabilitate the property or demolish the property at their cost. Owners that fail to respond to lawsuit risk losing their rights to the property at a court hearing.
- 5. The North Rosedale Park Block Captains' Special Meeting was held Tuesday, November 18th at the N. Rosedale Park Community House. The topic was City of Detroit Home Repair. The City of Detroit Planning and Development Department Supervisor Eric Johnson presented. The City of Detroit, through its Planning & Development Department, provides home repair services under the City of Detroit Building Grant Home Rehabilitation Program. Grant funds provided by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) assist homeowners with their home repair needs, eliminate lead-based paint hazards and address structural defects effecting health and safety of its residents. Additionally, the CDBG Home Rehabilitation Program supports the city's efforts to preserve existing housing inventory and stabilize neighborhoods. The Housing Rehabilitation Program Waiting List is now CLOSED. No further entries will be accepted at this time. The accepted names are drawn from this list to receive a CDBG Home Rehabilitation Application as targeted areas are identified and home repair funds are made available. The phone number is (313) 224-3461 for additional information.
- 6. I requested a "SPIRIT OF DETROIT" Award for Sam Bell from Council Member James Tate's office. The Board voted to give him this award for mowing Ramsay Park at a very low rate.



RIPPLING HOPE HOME REPAIR PROGRAM COMING IN FEBRUARY 2015

The 2015 District 8 Home Repair Program is sponsored by former State Representative David E. Nathan and the "RIPPLING HOPE" Ministry. This home repair program is about building stronger communities and standing together to help one another.

The "RIPPLING HOPE" Ministry's goal is to connect communities, channel hope and change lives. Last year, 85 Grandmont residents applied for and received home repair. All the work is done by volunteers.

Volunteers travel here from other states to help Detroiters. The volunteers are not only from Michigan but from Illinois, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas, Indiana, Ohio, North Carolina and Ontario Canada as well. Local volunteers pay \$25.00 for a one day registration fee. The other volunteers pay \$250.00 for a week of service.

"RIPPLING HOPE" volunteers will assess the home repair work that is to be completed. All you have to do is to purchase the materials needed to complete the home repair. Also you must pay the \$25.00 Grandmont dues and complete the application in order to be eligible. Applications will be available in February, 2015.

a' humbug! Winter is the ultimate wonderland of paradox; sunlight reflecting off the new fallen snow and ice crystals gleaming off tree branches, beautiful from the comfort of your living room. The reality is winter is a challenge for most and it is all about environment. Be proactive and keep your walkways, steps and driveway clear of snow. This creates a safe environment, reducing the possibility of slips and falls.

REMINDER: STREET SNOW REMOVAL IS

NOT FREE; it is covered by paying your annual Grandmont dues of only \$25.00.



Take part and enroll in the convenient GCA snow removal program. "GREENER STILL, INC." is our community's service



provider. You must contract with them separately to have the sidewalk in front of your house cleared ~ saving you the hassle of time, energy and money when the inevitable snow does come. Their advertisement is listed

on page 14 in this newsletter.

Consider placing debris out on the curb the day before bulk pickup instead of days ahead of pickup. This diminishes the possibility of the debris being tossed about and frozen to the ground thus unmovable.

"SLOW YOUR ROLL" when driving through the community. Black ice, visible ice, snow banks, poor visibility due to heavy snowfall, pedestrians, objects in the street covered by snow, freezing rain, etc. all could contribute to an unfortunate accident. SLOW IS SAFE!

Winter is often harsh on cars. If a car appears to be abandoned on your street, inoperable for some time, contact the Environment Committee (page 2) or our 8th Pct. NPO Shawn Childrey (page 12) to facilitate removal.

The Environmental Committee frequently surveys the neighborhood. Your active participation contributes to a strong and unified Grandmont Community. **THANK YOU AND HAPPY NEW YEAR!**

Our neighborhood relies on the good will and extra effort of each of us to make a good "first impression" of our community. Below are a few suggestions to help get the new year off to a good start and create better first impressions while unifying Grandmont Community expectations:

Curtains, drapery, and blinds should be in good condition and hung in the windows properly.

Sweep, shovel, or rake the street area in front of your home. Remove litter promptly!

Dogs should be leashed when being walked – and don't forget to carry and use the "pooper scooper" when needed.

Do not park your vehicles on the lawn or city-berm area.

Commercial trucks need to be parked **OUTSIDE** of our R-1 Zoned neighborhood. These vehicles are not allowed.

Remember that Basketball Hoops are illegal in the street. This is a serious safety concern for parents and children considering speeders and distracted drivers. **SLOW DOWN. PAY ATTENTION. BE SAFE!**

Park your vehicles off the street whenever possible – especially during our winter street snow-removal season! This request is for your (and your vehicle) safety and security. Please park in your driveway or garage.

Don't you agree that everyone should be able to enjoy a pleasant and serene view when we look out of our windows? Resolve in the New Year of 2015 to help make that view a reality in Grandmont.

I encourage you to see a movie there and assist with ongoing restoration of their oriental-themed movie theatre. Our group sincerely appreciates all the support from our five communities. We raised over \$1,000.00 to help with vacant property security and lawn maintenance. All of the money we make from fundraising goes toward keeping vacant properties and vacant lots clean and clear of debris in order to create a healthier environment for all of us. As an extra bonus, one of our Grandmont residents ~ Mary Muhammad ~ won a gift basket. Congratulations, Mary!

2014 ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

As part of the Vacant Property Task Force representing Grandmont in our **GRDC** neighborhoods, we accomplished many things in 2014. Vacant Properties have been secured, some demolished, boards have been painted, lawns cut, etc. We also prevented and actually worked to remove squatters from properties! **GRDC** hosted a Press Conference in November where our committee was instrumental – hand in

hand with exceptional Detroit Police work – to apprehend someone in our community who pled guilty to deed fraud and who took money from people and 'sold' properties he did not own. Another reason to trust – but verify! Check with the Register of Deeds as well as go to the Assessments Division of the Coleman A. Detroit Police Department Communications Operations Senior & Veteran 911 Profile Agreement

The Detroit Police Department and its members are firmly committed to providing professional service to all citizens in general. However, in an effort to improve our service delivery model for our senior citizens (65 years of age or older) and military veterans, the Detroit Police Department will be implementing a new service (Senior & Veteran 911 Profile). This service will allow our senior citizens and veterans to have their individual profiles stored in our 911 database and provide critical care information to the 911 call-takers in the event of an emergency situation. This should improve the call taking, dispatch and emergency response process.

The following agreement outlines the customer rights, responsibilities and use of the service. It shall also be used as a guide to identify what you can expect from the service. You are required to read, understand and agree to this agreement in its entirety. This form can be submitted either at your local district, via telephone (1-313-596-1777) or via fax (1-313-596-1610).

Rights, responsibilities, usage:

- You must be 65 years of age or older to utilize this service.
- You bear the sole and entire responsibility to keep your information accurate and current in our 911 database.
- You have full control over the information that you choose to share with 911. Only provide information that you want us to have access to.
- Your profile will be stored in our database for 1 year and must be renewed on an annual basis.
- You may terminate this service at any time.
- · Veterans may have a family member or caregiver make the request and/or sign for them

Service expectations:

- The information provided shall not be the sole means by which you will communicate information to 911 in the event of an emergency and is not intended to replace the most reliable method of supplying information to 911 personnel that being verbal transmission over the telephone.
- This does not constitute an agreement that emergency personnel will be dispatched to your event regardless of the situation.
- We accept no responsibility nor are we obligated to contact any person whom you have identified as a person of contact as part of your profile.
- There may be a time where factors either technical or operational that may prevent your profile from being provided to 911 personnel.


