Vacant Property Task Force Update: We are fortunate to have less vacant homes in Grandmont and within the Grandmont-Rosedale communities. The homes vacant in our community are either rental-lease houses, or homes being renovated for sale, with a few exceptions. While there are still some bad actors who refuse to comply with expected home maintenance and upkeep, we are working with them, the City, and in some cases other neighbors to encourage compliance to ordinances. Please help by removing flyers, papers from any vacant home near you. This action helps keep your home safer by making homes appear occupied.

Our committee has grown in scope to include working with the City identifying homes and rental homes not being repaired by their owners as this has a negative impact on our quality of life and property values.

If you rent your home, and have a significant problem that's not being addressed by your landlord, please contact me. I can help or refer you to a free counseling service to explain your rights as a tenant. Our information is always kept confidential if necessary.

Remember/Reminder: Foreclosure Prevention Help has consistently been available at GRDC. Information should be available soon to help you if it's not in this issue. Get more involved in your community so you don't miss opportunities to help you with information and resources available.

Happy Valentines' Day

First and foremost, be a good neighbor! But what does that mean? People seem to love the idea of a neighborhood - 'Love where you live.' Grandmont's motto is "Home of Good Neighbors." Where your home is surrounded by friendly faces willing to help you out if you're in a jam. Or, grill together for a block party. Or exchange babysitting or carpooling duties, etc.

But sometimes the ideal isn't the reality. How do you become a good neighbor? Or remain one if circumstances change? What if a neighbor plays their music too loud? Or never pays attention to our Garbage/Bulk schedules? Or the dog-from-hell barks too much - or terrorizes your children? Or never learned to park a car without infringing on your property? And then never even says "they're sorry" when your lawn is a sorry mess. Where do these people come from?

When they are your immediate neighbors, it's difficult to have a "Live & Let Live" philosophy. If the problem is literally in your backyard, you can't just walk away - at least we hope you don't. You are the neighbor we appreciate and want to keep - and help if we can.

We are a community of volunteers, and are not miracle workers. You will appreciate your home and community more if you have a good relationship with your neighbors. These are a few suggestions to help make it so.

When neighbors are the problem:

- Don't assume they know. Present the problem to them in a way that's not threatening or placing blame.
 Focus on the problem and not the person. Start out with something like, "I don't know if you know this but..."
- Talk to them. Don't let the situation fester. Be open and honest and be kind.
- Ask before doing. Be polite.
- Choose your battles wisely. Really consider if it's something to start a lingering feud over.
- Check your neighborhood rules and City Code before assuming something is illegal. Proof always helps validate your concern.
- Utilize the neighborhood to see if a letter can be sent from the community. Strength in numbers is effective once the issue has been communicated but ignored.
- Call the Police or NPO only when you feel personally threatened. Don't escalate the situation. Consider the possibility of mediation.
- Don't retaliate by doing something the offending neighbor won't like. The vicious circle that results helps no one.

When you are the problem:

- Consider first why your neighbor approached you in the first place do they have a young child that i disturbed by noise? Have they lived in and maintained this neighborhood for years? There is likely a reason they have appeared at your door. Your neighbor approached you because they have a problem they cannot solve alone. They need your help in making their neighborhood a more livable place.
- When confronted, try your best to remain calm and tell your neighbor you'll need time to consider the complaint. This gives you "cool down" time to avoid making any rash decisions you may later regret.
- Ask the neighbor what they want from you and carefully consider if you can accommodate their request. Offer an alternative solution if you can, that will work for you both.
- While working out the issue, be a good neighbor. Be friendly and help out where you can. The goal should always be making a new friend rather than creating a lasting enemy.

Remember, that sometimes actions by good example help make good neighbors. That's the goal of Grandmont - Home of Good Neighbors.

Rippling Hope

The Rippling Hope Organization spends yearly \$5,000 to help residents without money, fix porches and teach people skills. Rippling Hope is staffed by volunteers who work year-round on home repairs. They currently have 80 projects pending, due in part to having the smallest group of volunteers in 2019 since the group began. While the group regularly assists Grandmont residents with minor home repairs, their top-line priority is to assist in areas of highest need - which most frequently ends up being areas affected by natural disasters like floods, tornadoes, hurricanes, etc. Despite this, 84 volunteers flew in from New Jersey for a week, and a small group from Saginaw State University volunteered for a Saturday. Sadly, this is not on par with previous years because they just didn't have the volume of volunteers in 2019.

As a result of low volunteer turnout last year, 15 Grandmont residents had pending projects that have not yet been serviced by Rippling Hope. These projects are top of the list in 2020. Boston College students are coming in March to volunteer! To give back to these volunteers, each association and block club has volunteered to bring a meal for a group of volunteers. Get in touch to learn how you can help out and give back!

In other Rippling Hope news, Cora Duncan-Foster was recently inducted as a member of the Rippling Hope Board of Directors, thanks to a nomination from Carl Zerweck and approval of the Rippling Hope Board of Directors. This is a national group, and we are lucky to have representation on the board.

Paint distribution is available all year long at the Rippling Hope Center, 12801 Joy Rd, on the second Wednesday of each month 3-5PM and on the second Saturday, from 10-noon. The paint is free for Grandmont Residents. The residents must tell Carl that they are from Grandmont Community Association.
