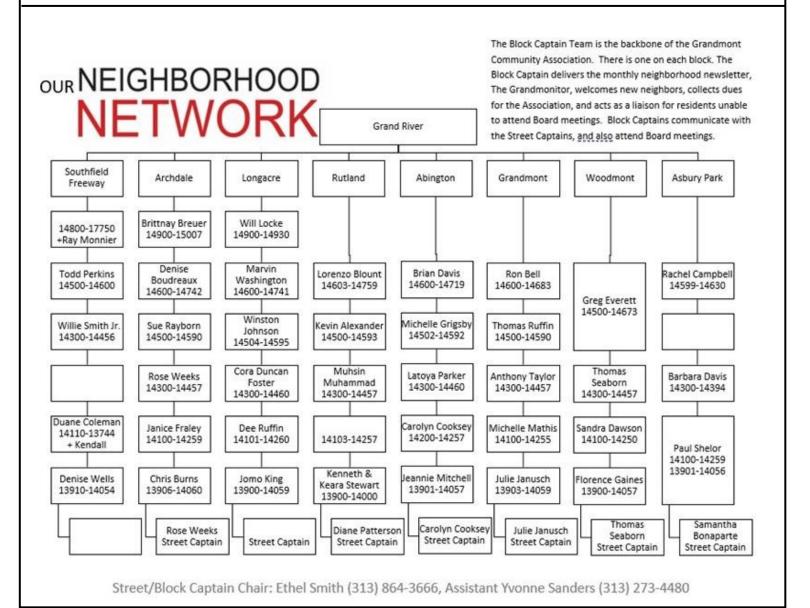

PORCH LIGHT COLORS—WHAT THEY MEAN

ighting and color influence our day-to-day functioning and wellbeing. By understanding the impact of different light colors, we can create more welcoming spaces. Your porch light color can play an important role in conveying a message or influencing your mood. While most people typically use a soft white color for their outdoor lighting, that's not your only color option. Depending on the mood you want to create, you have many other choices.

Choosing a **blue light** can either mean autism awareness or honoring police officers. Veterans Day is honored every November 11th by the US residents. It is on this day that you'll often see your neighbors turning their green porch lights on. Some may even keep their lights to represent St. Patrick's Day and Lime Disease Awareness.

Some people may turn their porch light red a couple of times a year depending on the occasion. In October, for example, **red porch lights** represent Halloween, while in February; those who celebrate St. Valentine's Day will often opt for red porch lights. This color is also associated with American Heart Health.

Another porch light color that you may have come across is **purple.** This color represents Domestic Violence Awareness. Since 2007, the Domestic Violence Task Force ran a campaign to raise awareness about domestic violence. This campaign was called Purple Late Nights.

When combining **blue and green** for your porch lighting, you are conveying the message of veteran recognition by valuing them as members of your community. This color combination is intended to spark conversation with regards to this subject.

VACANT PROPERTY TASK FORCE

ome good news to share. The Detroit Land Bank is rehabbing a long-time vacant house on Archdale. I've been told this will be a "Rehab & Ready" renovation which means this house should be available for sale at market price when all the improvements have been made.

More good news is the house bought by GRDC in 2019 also on Archdale has been completely renovated, landscaped, and available for sale. To those neighbors on the block, this is welcome news. The Archdale house was in very poor condition with some unexpected costly surprises. Their home renovations are now an inspiration to others to improve our properties and be proud of where you live — in the Grandmont Community. Thank you Grandmont Rosedale Development Corporation (GRDC).

The "not so good" news is that it's a long process with continuous challenges to remedy some years' long vacant properties and encourage absentee owners to make necessary repairs or sell these homes to those who can. Discussions with D1 Councilman James Tate, our D1 Neighborhood Liaisons Karla Williamson and Kya Robertson, and the Land Bank attorney's for Nuisance Abatement, are all part of many days work. We are also reporting these neglected homes on Improve Detroit and to BSEED, the City Building & Safety division, etc., and communicating through GRDC.



Often, neighbors will take care of some basic maintenance issues at neighboring vacant homes (lawn cutting, etc.) and to those neighbors a big THANK YOU is in order. Your kind and generous actions are truly appreciated and often unrecognized. The Catch 22 issue with that frustrates the inspection process when homes are determined to be in compliance. Tickets aren't issued, and the owner is not held accountable. To be clear, we would always prefer to have the property owner maintain their property, keep it clean and in good repair, rather than have tickets issued.

Sometimes, however, that's our last resort to get the owner to accept their responsibilities or, in extreme cases, perhaps lose their property by legal City action. Unfortunately, all streets in our neighborhood are represented on our list of neglected homes. We are optimistic, however, that the list is small, and in our quest to keep our neighborhood attractive, respected, and the Home of Good Neighbors, we have an abundance of caring neighbors who are continuously working as a Community to keep Grandmont a viable, safe and welcoming neighborhood. And that's very good news!

LAUGHTER IS GOOD FOR YOUR HEALTH!

Laughter relaxes the whole body. A good, hearty laugh relieves physical tension and stress, leaving your muscles relaxed for up to 45 minutes after.

Laughter boosts the immune system. Laughter decreases stress hormones and increases immune cells and infection-fighting antibodies, thus improving your resistance to disease.

Laughter triggers the release of endorphins, the body's natural feel-good chemicals. Endorphins promote an overall sense of well-being and can even temporarily relieve pain.

Laughter protects the heart. Laughter improves the function of blood vessels and increases blood flow, which can help protect you against a heart attack and other cardiovascular problems.

Laughter burns calories. Okay, so it's no replacement for going to the gym, but one study found that laughing for 10 to 15 minutes a day can burn approximately 40 calories—which could be enough to lose three or four pounds over the course of a year.

Laughter lightens anger's heavy load. Nothing diffuses anger and conflict faster than a shared laugh. Looking at the funny side can put problems into perspective and enable you to move on from confrontations without holding onto bitterness or resentment.

Laughter may even help you to live longer. A study in Norway found that people with a strong sense of humor outlived those who don't laugh as much. The difference was particularly notable for those battling cancer.

JUNE: THE DAYS GET HOTTER...

The nights get longer! On those steamy, HOT days, it's good to remember you can have a FREE City Tree planted on the area between your sidewalk and the street, and/or your corner lot berm area, by calling our Tree Planting Manager at 313-224-6391 or emailing her at squallsa@detroitmi.gov. While some people think trees are a nuisance (or make more work), it's good to remember that the benefits of trees far outweigh any negative aspects. Trees keep homes cool in the summer and can reduce energy costs by as much as 30%. Property values increase on streets with trees. Safer & healthier communities benefit by trees removing harmful pollution from the air, as well as reducing rainwater runoff and flooding. Trees reduce noise and add beauty and needed shade to keep cool - and sometimes curb tempers on those hot, sweltering days when summer madness takes hold!

On those LONGER nights, good neighbors are considerate neighbors. Those long summer nights can present another set of challenges to the quiet, peaceful sanctuary of our homes and the community expectations we deserve. When celebrating summer events with family and friends be mindful of your neighbors' right to quiet times, and a good night sleep. People work different shifts, children need down-time, and if you're just plain sick or tired, you won't want to hear the loud music (which usually translates to "Thump, Thump, Thump" in your head) from a nearby party, especially after 11:30pm. Don't be that rude, unkind, and thoughtless neighbor. And please don't engage a DJ for your event. A rented hall is just the spot for that. There is an enforceable noise ordinance with a steep fine that should be avoidable with cooperation and common courtesy.

ENVIRONMENTAL REMINDER. The fire ordinance for the City of Detroit prohibits front porch barbecuing or cooking. The Detroit City Council in 2017 amended the outdoor fire code unanimously, to prohibit "Outdoor Cooking" under a roof or enclosed area, which will include a front porch. The ordinance states front porch grilling is unsafe and creates unnecessary risks. In Wayne County, there is a 10-15 foot minimum distance from a structure. Open fires, including barrel fires, are not permitted in Wayne County. Smoke fumes are not healthy and are irritants.

The Detroit Ordinance States grills or outdoor cooking devices are permitted ONLY in the side yard or backyard of a home and must be at least 10 feet from a property line or fixed flammable object. This is the year to clear the clutter and rediscover your backyard and grill in safer and more relaxing surroundings.

Thank you for your flexibility as we modify our celebrations to keep one another safe.

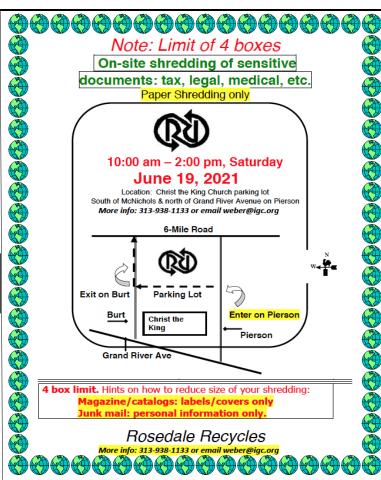

DID YOU KNOW?

Garbage Ordinance

You could face a steep fine for leaving your garbage container out on the street after a scheduled pickup? Your container also must be placed in the rear of your home – not in view. As a courtesy, please be a thoughtful neighbor. People don't need to - or want to-see your untidy garbage. Garbage should also always be bagged and secured to help keep rodents away and spilled litter to a minimum:

ORDINANCE: Section 22-2-45. Time limits for approved containers to remain at curb side.

"Properly stored domestic solid waste shall be collected by the Department of Public Works. Owners and/or occupants of residential structures who receive curbside collection shall place approved containers on a berm area not earlier than 6:00 p.m. on the day before collection and shall remove the same not later than 9:00 p.m. on the day of collection."

PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION of the above Ordinance

<u>VIOLATION</u> of Section 22-2-45 of this Code (above) is a <u>BLIGHT VIOLATION</u> and is subject to a fine:

\$200 for the first offense; \$300 for the second offense; \$500 for the third offense, & \$1,000 for the fourth or subsequent offense. In addition, "Each day on which any violation of Section 22-2-45 of this Code continues constitutes a separate offense and shall be subject to civil fines as a separate offense."

Please note: if you are a handicapped senior, and need help taking your container to the street and removing it, you can request a <u>Special Hardship Request</u> to DPW and the City may arrange for workers to help with this service. Restrictions apply. Asking a trusted neighbor might also be a helpful resource for you!
